through Jesus Christ, who gives himself for us. Amen.



<sup>14</sup> The Word became a human being and lived here with us.



<sup>19</sup> After King Herod died, an angel from the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph while he was still in Egypt. <sup>20</sup> The angel said, "Get up and take the child and his mother back to Israel. The people who wanted to kill him are now dead."



A reading from John, chapter 2.

Three days later Mary, the mother of Jesus, was at a wedding feast in the village of Cana in Galilee. <sup>2</sup> Jesus and his disciples had also been invited and were there.

- <sup>3</sup> When the wine was all gone, Mary said to Jesus, "They don't have any more wine."
- <sup>4</sup> Jesus replied, "Mother, my time hasn't yet come! [a] You must not tell me what to do."
- <sup>5</sup> Mary then said to the servants, "Do whatever Jesus tells you to do."
- <sup>6</sup> At the feast there were six stone water jars that were used by the people for washing themselves in the way that their religion said they must. Each jar held about 100 liters. <sup>7</sup> Jesus told the servants to fill them to the top with water. Then after the jars had been filled, <sup>8</sup> he said, "Now take some water and give it to the man in charge of the feast."

The servants did as Jesus told them, <sup>9</sup> and the man in charge drank some of the water that had now turned into wine. He did not know where the wine had come from, but the servants did. He called the bridegroom over <sup>10</sup> and said, "The best wine is always served first. Then after the guests have had plenty, the other wine is served. But you have kept the best until last!"


